Since she started playing the violin at the age of 4, Emma has won top awards in many competitions. Emma plays on the Jamieson-Ivey Amati violin from 1670, on loan from Royal Conservatory of Music.

Colleen Venables from Canada, won Second Laureate, and a prize of \$5,000 (Charles W. Fine Violins Award), and a violin bow made by Lloyd Liu(one of great bow maker of our life value at\$7500).
